Second graders have been very busy in the past few weeks! They spent time writing letters to veterans overseas for Veteran's Day. In ELA, they read a story about service dogs and had real service dogs visit their classrooms! And they also added a bearded dragon & fish to their habitats in science. A New Way

Third graders have concluded their Number Stories Unit and are beginning to learn more about mathematical operations. They will start to solve larger addition and subtraction problems by learning new strategies! Their conceptual understanding will increase as they apply expanded form in both these operation methods.



Pieces and Parts

Fourth graders are beginning their first Fractions Unit in math class. Students are using their understanding of basic multiplication facts to apply the Equivalent Fraction Rule, while also comparing fractions to the half and whole on number lines. Fourth graders are gaining lots of math skills and vocabulary knowledge in multiplication and fractions! Ask a fourth grader how to play BUMP and Kaboom!

How do I help my child when the (math) homework is so different from what I did in school?

Homework may look different from when you were in school and the amount of it may be different also. Practice is still important and students continue to do that. Students will still be expected to memorize basic facts, and you'll still see homework that asks you to help them do that. But, we know from research that students need activities and tasks that allow for a deeper understanding of the math. These tasks may take longer to solve and so fewer problems are assigned. But these problems will help students understand how integral math is in their lives and will continue to be in the workplace.
