

**What limits would you put on cell phone/technology usage for Faculty/Staff?**

They can be responsible without setting limits
They should be allowed to have phones with them but not use them during instructional time
Phone use during planning & lunch periods only
Not allowed unless before school, homeroom, study halls, after school, Allowed on vibrate incase of emergency with their families. Teachers have lives just like everyone else.
Faculty and staff should be using cell phones/technology for instructional purposes only - for communication between professionals, parents, and for teaching. All personal use should be outside of the school day, or during lunch.

Limit non emergency use but allow access to faculty
On cellphone if needed
All phones put away during class times
Emergency only - between periods- free periods- must remind ourselves that everyone else at work has their phone attached to them as well! Careful that we don't hold teachers to a standard we don't hold ourselves at work!!
Cell phones should not be limited for faculty and staff during non-instructional time or breaks. Cell phones should not be used by faculty/staff unless there is an emergency or is being utilized for work purposes. Technology usage should relate to work.

Hold staff accountable but allow them some usage flexibility with administrative permission
Faculty may have their phones/technology in order to gain access to emails, quick contact with building personnel, etc. However, any unnecessary contact or usage should result in some form of discipline. The faculty needs to have a phone on them to gain access to Schoology and their emails, so it is of utmost importance to not allow faculty to use technology on their person during the day.

Cell phones/Technology for communication purposes.

No cell phone use during class unless it's an emergency or used for lesson purposes. Faculty should integrate technology when appropriate to build upon and enhance curriculum.

The staff need their cell phones in order to log in with Duo. Therefore, they are needed. Teachers also need their cell phones in case there is an emergency and can't get to our classroom phones.

Permitted between classes , on break .

No personal cell phone use during class

Technology for teaching - smartboard, tablets, etc. cell phone is only for the duo app and parent communication - however, personal usage should be reserved for lunch and personal time only.

During school hours, the teacher's attention is to be on the students not their cell phone. I understand checking it periodically or during planning periods and lunch for missed messages.

No phones in the classroom. Use of technology for specific instructional purposes.

Cell phones on lunch breaks or before/after school

Emergency use (school emergency not personal) fine - limit other useage to free times at the teacher's discretion

No limits

No social media postings during the school day

I use my cellphone to quickly and easily email/text staff members (like Mr. Lauer, Dawn, etc. when there are Chromebook issues or building secretaries if a question arises) and I actually feel guilty for having it out otherwise. I feel like a hypocrite when I even have to log in to our required security Duo Mobile app. I try not to use it when students are in my room except at times of family medical emergencies. And if I do use it, I always let the students know what I'm doing so they don't think I'm just randomly texting friends. I find it easier to enforce a cell phone policy if I model that I am also following the same

rules. During lunch, prep, and after hours, I feel that staff members can be trusted with cell phones and school internet access. Individual abuses can be addressed by admin.

Faculty and staff should not be on their cell phones during class time. However, staff must use their cell phones to take attendance (Duo app). Also, if students ask me what the weather will be at a certain time of day (recess, practice after school, etc.), I will look at my weather app to tell them the forecast. Staff should have their cell phones on silent during the school day unless they have a legitimate reason. For example, when I was having surgery, I needed to answer the call the day before to find out what time/location to be at the hospital. Also, if someone is the only primary caregiver for an elderly parent/grandparent, they must be allowed to pick up their phone if there is an emergency. For example, the care service calls me that my grandmother's life alert was pressed. In the few instances that I have had to take an emergency call, I apologize to my class and explain why I had to take that call. It offers a chance to discuss times that are necessary to answer a call and cell phone etiquette. Technology should be used as the teacher sees fit. However, with the extensive use of technology in everyone's lives (including children), students need to learn how to effectively communicate with one another. As technology use increases exponentially, students verbal/communication skills decrease at the same rate. Teaching after Covid has taught me that we need to spend as much time as possible in the classroom developing communication skills that students will need to be successful their entire lives.

No cellphone calls while in classroom except for emergencies. No cellphone use when supervising students. Example: playground, outdoor activities, cafeteria monitoring, hallway monitoring

Teachers shouldn't be using them in class (cell phones)

Staff should not be able to use their phones during instructional time.

Use for instructional purposes, limited personal use, especially during class time (emergencies)

OWhen needed... emergencies....not during classtime.

Faculty/Staff should have phones on silent unless there are extenuating circumstances. They should only take phone calls/or texts in emergency situations during class time. Faculty/Staff should only use laptops for school related purposes and should refrain from using them during class time unless it is necessary for the lesson or they are monitoring student device activity on "lightspeed".

In my career, my clients cannot choose what I do with my phone. If you don't trust your teachers and staff to do the right thing, maybe you should re-evaluate your staffing choices. No one should be making this decision outside of the school district. If there is an emergency in a classroom that my child is in and there is not a single cell phone in the room, I'm not going to be happy. A phone on the wall isn't going to cut it if they have to hide.
